Riley Harrison was in Co. A. 24th Va. Reg, captured at Farmville, taken to Point Lookout Md, parolled June 14, 1865.

First. My will is that all my just Debts be fully paid.

Second:...to my son andrew J. Slusher, his heirs and assigns forever the following lands situated in the county of Lafayette aforesaid to wit, the west half of the North East quarter, and the west half of the South East quarter of Section 27 in Township 51 of Range 26, containing 160 acres. Also the Southeast quarter of the North East quarter and the North East Quar ter of the North East quarter of Section 35 in the Township and Range aforesaid containing 80 acres, also a certain other tract of land containing 141 17/100 acres being the same conveyed to me by Joseph Dixon by Deed bearing date Aug. 6, 1833; and now on record in said County in Book D at page 137. Also one other tract of 179 acres, being the same conveyed to me by James Campbell by deed bearing date the 24 Eleventh: ... to Jordan James the sum of th day of November 1846 and now on record in the Recorder's Office of said county in Book L at page 252.

Also 140 acres off the North side of the North west quarter of section 35 in Towntwo hundred & fifteen acres being all that part of a tract of 245 acres conveyed to mewhereof I hereto set my hand and seal this by Stephen Donohoe, except 30 acres thereof16th day of May 1853. hereinafter devised to David Pfleger, also one other tract of 60 80/100 conveyed to me by Joseph Dixon by Deed bearing date August 6th 1833, and now of Record in the Recorders office in Book D at pg. 135. Also one other tract of ten acres conveyed to me by David Pfleger by Deed dated April the 8th 1842, and now of Record in Book H at pages 356 and 357.

Tenth:... to the seven children of Isaac Gilham the sum of \$100 to be equally di-

\$500.

Twelfth:... to the children of Roland Slusher the sum of \$1000 to be equally divided between them and no more.

Thirteenth: ... to my wife Christina Slusher the sum of \$1,200 also a good Horse, Saddle and Bridle, one bed, all my cooking dutensils, one good cow, and six chairs and one table.

Lastly, appoint my son Henry Slusher and ship 51 of Range 26 - also 1 other tract of son in law bavid Pfleger Executors of this my last will and Testament. In witness

I suspect that all of us with the last name of Slusher received recently a communication from a firm in Ohio purporting to send us for the price of \$2.00 a "research report" on the Slusher family. We, for one, sent for it to see what it says and, among other things, it says that there are approximately 1000 heads of households in the U. S. with the "old and distinguished Slusher name", which, estimating 3.2 persons per household in America today would yield an approximate total of 3,200 people in the U. S. with the Slusher name. They sent a coat of arms, - a picture of it - which is not exactly like the one we sent out with the 1st anniversary letter, but mostly in that it has no key on it, and has bove the shield "an oval shield changed as the arms bordered silver with natural colored peacock plumes."

We have had one person ask us if we sent our mailing list to this person, and we would like to put on record the answer: a flat "NO". Under no circumstances is our mailing list available to ANYONE. We do not believe in selling mailing lists or passing it around in any form!

We received a note, in answer to our request, from an Historical and Gemalogical Researcher in Frederick County, Va. stating his fees for research are \$3.00 an hour, which doesn't seem too much (and isn't for genealogical research by a qualified person) but when you stop to add up \$3.00 an hour for just 4 eight-hour days, you have nearly \$100.00 contracted for and our treasury doesn't qualify for this type expenditure.

The primary reason that there are four pages to the letter this time, instead of the usual three, is that there is a possibility, though hopefully not a probability that this will be the last of these letters you will receive. Or there is a possibility that we will be sending the letter to those only who have paid their dues. The only expenses our organization has had so far are the expenses for mailing the Newsletters. The miles the Kings put on their automobile and the time they spend on the records, and the time it takes us to compile, stencil, mimeograph, fold and stuff the letter into envelopes, and the time the envelope addressers put in don't cost us anything. They are labors of love and friendship because we are interested in the progress of our Organization. There is an infinite amount of all these things 'spent', but not for money - only the postage, paper, stencils, envelopes, etc. cost us money. Mostly postage, since the cost of sending a letter has gone up - without that we'd have been in better shape.

We realize that some of us have a monu- for which we don't receive a bill. mental lack of interest in the genealogy of our family and that the letters are probably like so much Greek to us. There are sher, Route #3, Box 18, Floyd, Va. 24091 some of us, who didn't ask to receive the letter in the first place, who just throw it out every quarter, though some probably save it in case anyone ever is interested in it! If you are one of these you might send us a postcard asking that your name be removed from the list if you don't mind, please.

One of the main Aims in the Organizing of the Slusher Family was stated as "To further the study of the genealogy of the Slusher Family". We have done very little of this. Though we have gathered into a central file a considerable amount of the family data, we know nothing about the antecedents of Christopher that we did not know two years ago. This is not progress!

One of the main troubles with the world today, if you can believe what you read, is said to be the breakdown of the family unit.

This was supposed to be one of the reasons why Rome fell, too! We believe that it is important to have a strong and interested Family Organization in this world today. We do not believe that our Family Organization can survive on Biennial Reunions, to which many of us can't always come. We believe that this is one of the reasons to continue the Newsletter!

We have plans for it, if we continue it after July. We have quite a lot of data that there has not been time or space to publish yet. And we have the families of several of the distaff sides of the family which run back much farther than the Slusher family currently does.

So, if there are any of you who have not paid your \$2.00 dues for the past year, it would be a wonderful thing if we could receive them before the July Reunion, so that our Treasury wouldn't be such a pitiful little thing. Perhaps some of us have just forgotten - its awfully hard to remember to pay things
