"Without genealogy the study of history is lifeless." -John Fiske "Record it for the grandson of your son." - Nicholas Vachel Lindsay

The first quotation above brings to mind an article we read in for you to make a note of on the the Spring 1975 issue of PROLOGUE. The Journal of the National Archives, if you don't have a 1976 calendar. The article, entitled "History and Genealogy: Patterns of Change and Prospects for Cooperation," by Samuel P. Hays, states that after years and years of more or less mutual contempt between historians and genealogists, within the past ten years or so, they have both begun to realize that closer cooperation and respect for the work they both do would be mutually advantageous. Makes sense.

This Newsletter is about two months late - the first time one has been late since 1970 when we first began sending them. We beg forgiveness, but under the circumstances it has been absolutely impossible to get it out sooner. There is present ly a lull in the redecorating and addition to the house which we are undertaking; between the sawing and banging and the moving of furniture which we could do ourselves inside the house, and the same which will begin shortly (hopefully!) when the contractor begins work, if he ever does. We figured we better take advantage of this time, because heaven knows when there will be another lull of which advantage can be taken!

First of all, from the last Newsletter, the Solomon book turned up - thanks! Also, two people have written adding to their lines which appeared in the Newsletter and correcting some mistakes. We are most grateful to these folks and wish some more would do the same.

Secondly, an important date last page of this year's calendar And that is the date of the 1976 Biennial Reunion of the Slusher Family Organization in Floyd, Va. at the VFW Hall. The date is:

JULY 18, 1976

We think this will be a pretty good date. Those of you serving on your local Bicentennial committees should have your main projects complete and can take a short vacation and sally forth to Floyd, Virginia. So make plans now - and don't forget to put down the date. You'll be reminded from time to time hereafter, but you might as well make a note of it so nothing interferes.

Just after the last Newsletter our genealogist notified us that he had gone to work full time in a Library and would have to stop our research. So we have a new genealogist. He has gone through the material at the National Archives, the Library of Congress and the DAR Library, which he says is the best genealogical library in the country except the one in Salt Lake City, and he has also gone through all the documents, papers and reports of other genealogists, and he says that there just isn't much else that can be done, or much of anywhere else to look for proof of the relationship between Christopher and Peter Schlosser. He is going to go through whatever he can find on Lancaster Co., Pa. and possibly Bucks Co., Pa. where Christopher, Jr. is supposed to have been born.

He says it is really quite

evident that Christopher is Peter's son, but so far the proof is non-existant. Maybe it'll turn up out of clear blue sky some day, and may be we can never find it because it just isn't there.

The genealogist went through some of the same things some of the other genealogists have done and found nothing they hadn't found, as well as many sources that had not been searched. This was a good thing because it takes away any doubt that all sources have been covered and nothing has been overlooked. Its too bad, really. That Christopher is a pesky ancestor to have, with respect! We're so close and yet so far away — Its certainly frustrating.

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We spent most of the months of February, March and April putting the names of the descendants of Peter and Barbara on index cards. It had not been planned to make all those index cards, But trying to find a proper format and numbering system for the up to 10 generations and get it on paper in a straight line from Peter and Barbara to the youngest child born in 1975, turned out otherwise to be an impossible job. Those people kept slithering around in and cut of the proper generation - or out altogether! So now we have cards with names, a family sheet number and a pedigree all the way back to Peter or Barbara on each card, and there's no way those people can get lost now. Several are descended from two of Christopher's children too - through both parents. Its interesting, but awfully complicated. And if it never gets published, we, at least, will have a pretty good history of the Slusher family. What we're hoping is

that it can be complete in at least rough draft form by July 18, 1976, and it can then be properly discussed at the Reunion on said date. But with all this construction going on around here it depends on how long they keep the files covered up with all the stuff they don't seem to be able to think of anywhere else to put.

Would you believe some 1,500 - 2,000 index cards in just those two lines? In less than 175 years? And this does not include many lines we seem to have no information on. What an index! And do you know what's missing from the family pages more than anything else?

PLACES!!

ALSO LOTS OF DATES!!

People were born, married or died in thin air - not a place mentioned. This is ridiculous! sort thing does not look well in a published genealogy. Also, parents of the brides are missing. We're not Women's Libbers at all, but any one who has done any work on the genealogy of their family knows what a hassle it is to find so many of the wives names, much less their parent's names and we are really just as much descended from our mothers as from our fathers! Aren't we?

If you have any idea at all that your family data has been sent in without the places and dates of birth, etc. of the members of your family, the very least you can do is rectify the situation by sending this information in to the Kings or to us, so that it can be included. Really, now.

If we are going to compile this genealogy at all, and it seems foolish not to since we do have so much more information than most families, it surely needs to be much more detailed than what we have seen of Peter's and Barbara's lines.

Here is a letter from Henry Slusher, son of Stephen and Charlotte Hylton Slusher to his brother, Samuel. This letter was printed a couple of weeks ago in THE FLOYD PRESS, but needs to go into the record.

Floyd County, Va. August 3, 1967

Dear Brother

This wet morning afords me the pleasure of answering your kind let ter which came to hand day befor yes ture day bearing date June 30thwas a long time getting her. I was glad to her from you all hear you all was well and satisfide tree 5 bee stands 2 single tree I leart from a letter that A. Dickerson that I J was not satisfide. We are all in comon health the health of the county is only Tolerble at present Chrisly Bowman is dead & John Poff died very sudet he cradle grain all day and was Taken that evening and died next morning with cramp colick case by drinking cold water the doctor Thought our wheat was not very good Rye was Tolerble damage by the storm oats is good plain of rust on late oats and coen is late and uneven grass is good as ever growed her catle is bring a good Price good year olds from 10 to 15 2 year olds from 20 to 30 dolars carn 60 cts rye 75 to \$1.00

I now will say something about our afairs so from your leter and what you rote you had som fears that I might act the rufe

with you by taken the benefit of the stay law I never have had one thought of it I intend pay all that ou you as soon as I can posable do it no man can ever say and tell the truth that they ever herd me say that I intend to take the beafiet of that law all i as of you is to give me a chase have confidene in you that you will do so as far as your afairs will alow you. I think can Pay the most of it this fall I will let the last thing go that I can spair and if there is chance to Borow anuff to pay it all off I will do so you wis me to send you a statement of our afars I now will give you a lis of the property belonging to u I have sold all the stalk except the horses and the cownes Wagon and 4 Pair of gears 2 shovel plowes 1 colter Whaeat fan 2 Axes 2 iron wedges 1 set cooper tools 1 set plains, 1 hillside Plow 2 hoes 2 matock 2 mowing sythe 1 sythe and blade 1 doble one cuting base 1 shovel 1 4 prong fork the grind stone is worn out and some other things I will be acontable for there may be som other things left out I haven tim to study on present. I will now give you the amount that I hav in hand in money and du u is one hundred and fifty doars forty od odd dolars of this is gole, and there is \$27 of this amount be hind the stay law 15 dolars of it on uncl John Harman I recon they will pay it. Arch has got your Sadle there has no price ben set on it So I must come to a close I started a leter to I J Martin som time back give my respects to my a**c**uaintee Nancy and the children sends ther love to you all you must write when you expect to come in This from your afectionate Brother Henry Slusher to Samuel Slusher Jackson Co. Kansas

1975. Lexington is in Lafayette
County, Mo. where Christopher, Jr.
took his family to live in 1828.
The article is written by Mark
Poindexter and is entitled Lafayette County may get sister in
France and is quoted in part below:

"The mayor of the French village5b of Chavaniac-Lafayette, birthplace of the French general for whom Lafayette County is named, has indicated that he favors his town becoming a sister community with Lafayette County (Mo.) Georges Autuche, mayor of Chavaniac-Lafayette 5d indicated his support for the proposal in his response to a letter from Charles G. Coy, president of the Lafayette County American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. "We would be most happy should this project be realized," Autuche told Coy in a letter received in Lexington this week.

Chavaniac is located in southern France in the department of Haute Loire.

Mayor Autuche said that both he and the Chavaniac-Lafayette City Council were moved by Lafayette County's request that their city pair with Lafayette County in a program of cultural exchange as a lasting Bicentennial project.

Autuche enclosed with his letter a brochure about Chavaniac Lafayette and its most famous inhabitant, General Gilbert Roch Motier de Lafayette, the American Revolutionary War hero."
